Dear Parents/Guardians

I hope that all of you are keeping safe and finding ways to keep your spirits up! The COVID-19 pandemic has brought about many challenges, and this period could have been tough-going for many of us. Please continue to take care of yourselves so that you can in turn take care of your children.

The image and poem are reminders of the possibilities when the impossible seems more probable! We can learn lessons about perseverance from nature and these are important lessons that we can share with our children.

I would like to encourage all parents/guardians to read this poem with your child/ward, with reference to our school values of **Perseverance** and **Lead Self**, along with 'Growth Mindset' and 'Grit'. You could discuss the following with them:

- What does the 'concrete' represent in their lives? What are their obstacles?
- How can your child/ward break through concrete, just like how the rose had grown from a crack in the concrete? What can they do to overcome their <u>obstacles</u> and reach their dreams?

You can also show your child/ward pictures or highlight real-life examples of the resilience and perseverance of nature, and then connect these images to how your child/ward should live their own lives. These are life skills that are critical to help our children rise above the challenges brought about by the pandemic.

Angela Duckworth's TED Talk on "grit" as one of the most important predictors of success went viral in 2013. You may have seen it in a previous issue but I attach it once again for your reference:

Duckworth's definition of grit is **"passion and perseverance toward long-term goals".** However, despite the prevalence of grit, Duckworth says the concept is often misunderstood and that people often overlook the part about 'passion'.

"I think that the passion piece is at least as important. I mean, if you are really, really tenacious and dogged about a goal that's not meaningful to you, and not interesting to you — then that's just drudgery." - Angela Duckworth

Here are 2 steps you can start with:

STEP 1:

A study by psychology researchers, including Dr. Carol Dweck and Dr. David Yeager, indicates that students are more **motivated** to succeed when they have a core purpose. The study involved brief online interventions, including asking students to write how the world could be a better place, reading stories about how performing in school could help them positively impact the world, and having students think about their own dreams and how their education could help them achieve their goals.

HELP YOUR CHILD FIND PURPOSE

Discuss their goals and purpose in life. Then, talk about the steps that would be required in order for your child to reach their goal. Encourage them to create a dream board to help visualize their purpose and goals.

As students developed the belief they could achieve **<u>purpose</u>** in life, they grew more motivated and performed better holistically. You can help your child/ward develop **grit** (both passion and perseverance) by discussing their **goals** and purpose in life. Then talk about the steps required in order for them to reach their goal.

STEP 2:

ENCOURAGE TO CONDUCT "GRIT INTERVIEWS"

Encourage your child to interview grandparents, neighbors, or other acquaintances who have worked hard toward a long-term goal.



SHARE STORIES OF GRITTY FAMOUS PEOPLE

Children learn **pessimism** or **optimism** from the adults in their lives, so providing opportunities for your child/ward to learn from positive, resilient adults is key.

Your child/ward can interview grandparents, neighbours, or other acquaintances who have worked hard toward a long-term goal. With the pandemic, these interviews may have to be limited to close family members or via online meetings, where possible.

These interviews will teach your child/ward how to live life with grit in addition to the benefits that come with passion and perseverance. I invite you to share your resilience stories with your child/ward as well. It is helpful for kids to understand that even adults can make mistakes, but then try again and ultimately solve a problem or reach a goal. As your child/ward hears stories about grit from people they admire (including you), they will want to mirror these values in their own life!

Your child/ward can also learn from stories about famous people who used passion and perseverance to reach their long-term goals, often with failures or setbacks along the way. Stories like Michael Jordan not making his University team, or J.K. Rowling's manuscript for Harry Potter being rejected almost a dozen times, will show your child/ward that perseverance through failure can lead to great success.

If any of these famous people had given up when they experienced failure, they would never have achieved their fame and success. "Luck" is an illusion; success is about hard work and persistence towards something you are passionate about!



2021 marks our nation's 56th birthday, and the theme for our National Day this year is **'Together, Our Singapore Spirit'**. We hope every Singaporean will remain united and spur one another on to overcome setbacks in order to build a stronger Singapore for our future generations.

Yumin Champions had a blast celebrating our nation's birthday through a series of activities! To reinvigorate and showcase our Singapore spirit, P1 to P3 reminisced a piece of Singapore's history by making a dragon playground puppet. The English Language Department organised the Speak Good English Movement (SGEM) week from 12 to 16 July 2021. Several activities were carried out that week to enable students to experience the use of English Language in a fun and interesting way!

On 6 July 2021, as a precursor to SGEM week, the department invited an author, Neil Humphreys, to conduct a zoom sharing session on how to write funny stories. Classroom activities such as 'Lingo Bingo' and 'Do you speak Good English' were also conducted during English lessons to strongly encourage students to practise good pronunciation and grammar when speaking. The highlight of the week was 'Book Character Day', where students came to school dressed as their favourite story book characters! Teachers will inform your child about their preferred mode of communication e.g. Class Dojo or email

Unlike in school, an adult may not always be present to supervise your child. It is important to work out a routine:
